

Update on HR1239



To amend the National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom Act of 1998 to provide additional staff and oversight of funds to carry out the Act, and for other purposes.

Latest Action: House committee/subcommittee actions. Status: Committee Consideration and Mark-up Session Held. This occurred on June 28, 2007.

This bill, sponsored by Rep. Alcee Hastings (D-FL) now has 66 co-sponsors, but only 3 of Indiana's 9 Representatives have signed on: Julia Carson -7^{th} Dist., Mark Souder -3^{rd} Dist., and Dan Burton -5^{th} Dist. It is imperative that we work to get more of our own Congressmen on board in order to continue our work in documenting, researching and securing a part of Hoosier History. I now come to that part of my life during which I planned, and finally succeeded in making my escape from slavery. But before narrating any of the peculiar circumstances, I deem it proper to make know my intention not to state all the facts connected with the transaction. My reasons for pursuing this course may be understood from the following: First, were I to give a minute statement of all the fats, it is not only possible, but quite probable, that others would thereby be involved in the most embarrassing difficulties. Secondly, such a statement would most undoubtedly induce greater vigilance on the part of slaveholders than has existed heretofore among them; which would, of course, be the means of guarding a door whereby some dear brother bondman might escape his galling chains.
